

Report on the ETRC Quadruple JH / SH AKC Hunt Test April 1-2, 2023, Hiwassee Reserve

Our second AKC hunt test of the season was this past weekend, April 1 and 2, at the Hiwassee Reserve in Beechwood, TN. This was a quadruple JH / SH test, meaning that we ran two Junior Hunter and Two Senior Hunter stakes each day — four active sites running at once. This is a difficult format to manage, since even more than standard hunt tests with single JH, SH and even 2 MH stakes, there are many more people running in multiple stakes each day. We even had one woman who ran her dog in all 8 stakes (and qualified in most of them!). But, this meant that each stake was always looking for people who were running somewhere else — and Hiwassee is a large place, so it was a challenge to get people where they needed to be to avoid delays. Our marshals were amazing, and did a great job of coordinating between themselves to get people where they needed to be.

We ended up with 147 entries in the four Junior tests, and 65 entries for Senior. As always, most of the dogs were Labrador retrievers, but we had quite a few Goldens, a handful of poodles, a Springer Spaniel, and a Flatcoat. Good to see the other breeds out working in the field!

The weather turned out to be pretty nice — but Friday night there was a terrible storm with over two inches of rain. It had cleared out by about 7 a.m. down in Birchwood, but there were some muddy spots where several vehicles got stuck and had to be pulled out. Saturday was a high of 75, brilliantly sunny, but was also super windy with gusts up to 50 mph. Several of the WMA's portapotties blew over, and in the early afternoon, an enormous tree blew down on Priddy Road, which is the only way in and out of the preserve. Several of our workers had to spend a considerable amount of time working with one of the neighboring farmers to get the road cleared so we could leave in the evening by the time the test finished! Luckily, by Sunday the wind had died down and we were treated to a sunny day with a high of 65. It was pretty cold in the morning though — lows were around 35.

A big thanks to the bird technicians, college kids from the Cumberland State Community College Wild-life Society, who as always were terrific. We were even more grateful this time since one of the bird technicians, a tiny young woman, was an EMT and provided prompt and extremely professional support to one of our members who suffered a dizzy episode with a low enough heart rate that we called an ambulance to transport the person to a hospital where they were checked out and treated. As a result, the Board of Directors has taken two actions: (1) we have voted to donate another \$500 to the Wildlife Society in gratitude for going above and beyond the call of duty; and (2) we are going to research and buy a defibrillator and possibly other equipment so that we can provide prompt first aid for anyone who might have a serious problem in the future. As isolated as we are at these test sites, and as far away from hospitals, we need to beef up the equipment that we can use until professional help arrives.

Thanks also to our eight judges — Senior judges on Saturday were James Cuddihy / Lisa Styles and Kenny West/ Robert Shell. These two pairs judged Junior stakes on Sunday. Senior Judges on Sunday were Clint Catledge / J. Michael Evans, and Lisa Vencille / Bonnie Cuddihy. These pairs judged Junior stakes on Saturday. We are proud that three of these judges are also ETRC members — J. Michael Evans, Lisa Vencille, and Lisa Styles.

And, thanks to everyone who helped out putting on this test — Mike Evans (in addition to judging); Alan Bruhin, Mike Smith, and Jim Pearce, who broke down and set up tests while also acting as relief marshals (Alan), running test dogs (Mike), serving as Duck Meisters (Mike, Alan, Mike and others), helping to fix lunches (Jim), and clearing trees (Alan and Mike); Michele Fletcher who was not only the hunt test secretary but ran test and bye dogs and marshaled; Lois Luthenauer who marshaled, helped run communications from the office, sold ETRC merchandise, and ran errands; her nephew Gavin Sigmund who spent time throwing birds, setting up and breaking down tests, and running errands; Matt Eden who marshaled, helped setup and tear down tests, and even helped make sandwiches;

Pam Buck and Denise Chambers who also marshaled and kept the test running smoothly, and Karen Edwards who made lunches, paid the bills, sold tee shirts, took out trash, and ran the ribbon ceremonies. Our first AKC hunt test of the season is in the books. 66 dogs were entered, with 8 dogs on the waiting list — and 7 were scratched at the last moment. It was a cold, cold morning — 23 to 25 degrees both days although it warmed up nicely in the afternoon. As a result, the water work on the second morning was kept short and sweet, and we finished the test by 9:15 in the morning. 42 dogs passed.

Open Training Days at the Retriever Retreat



All levels of training will be included, and thawed ducks will be available. Drills in the morning, set ups in the afternoon. 8:30 a.m. Central time to 4:30 p.m. Central time.

You must call ahead if you want to attend any or all days — 865-803-1187 — so Lois knows how many to expect. Pack a lunch and drinks / water for your dogs, plus any training equipment you want to bring along. There will be a bucket for voluntary donations to help cover the cost of ducks.

The Retriever Retreat is located at 3058 Martha Washington Road, Clarkrange, TN . GPS gives good directions to this location about 15 miles north of Crossville. There is a small technical pond on the property for water work, and nice land for marks and blinds. A pavilion is available for eating lunch, as well as a bathhouse with toilets.
