## ETRC Club Trial #2 April 6, 2025, Brian Caldwell's Farm

**BREAKING NEWS:** This club trial will include live flyers, probably pheasants, and a cookout! In order to get a live flyer, you MUST RSVP prior to Thursday, April 3. Free birds are for members only!



Our second spring club trial is coming up on Sunday, April 6 at 9:00 a.m. at Brian Caldwell's farm in Georgetown. People who are judging and doing set-ups, please plan to arrive about half an hour early. The GPS address and directions are listed below.

Judges will be Club members, several of whom are licensed AKC judges, including Master National judge Alan Bruhin and upcoming MN judge and MN competitor J. Michael Evans, among others yet to be identified. We will need people to pitch in and trade off on planting blinds, rebirding, and setting up and taking down the equipment. We will be using our club-owned bumper launchers to reduce the amount of time people have to spend out in the field throwing marks and firing wingers.

**STAKES:** Singles Classic, Master, Senior, Junior, Puppy Stakes (Junior puppy & Senior Puppy, under 1 yr). Entry Fee: \$10.00 each stake per dog (dokkens), Puppy Stakes (bumpers) \$5.00 (1 PM). **The first two entries for members will be free**. Completion ribbons will be awarded for hunt test stakes and Advanced Junior stakes; placement 1-4 and JAM ribbons will be awarded for Singles Classic and the two puppy stakes. If you are interested in consideration for our end-of-the-year awards for Gun Dog and Puppy or the Year, successful completions in Master, Senior, Junior, and puppy stakes count towards those awards.

**OPEN TO MEMBERS AND NON-MEMBERS, PROS AND AMATEURS.** If you would like to join ETRC, membership forms will be available at the Trial. Membership is \$25 for a year, and entitles you to a monthly newsletter and other member benefits like our awards banquet & free club trial entries.

WHAT TO BRING: No E-collars allowed if you want to participate for ribbons and awards points. Collars will be allowed if you want to use the session for training only. All dogs must be on leash when out of vehicle unless running tests. Bring your retriever, a chair(s), your lunch, and water for you and your dog, plus appropriate clothing for the weather. NO WHITE SHIRTS please, wear something neutral or dark. If you are bringing a puppy, you may bring your own retrieval items if you wish.

**WEATHER CANCELLATION POLICY:** We will send out an email on Saturday night if the weather is such that we are going to have to cancel. We will not cancel just for chilly conditions or light rain, but if it is expected to be monsoon-raining, heavy electrical storms or snowing in Georgetown, we will not run. So be sure to check your email Saturday night! If you don't hear anything, come on out. If we have to cancel, we will set up another date later in the spring.

ETRC TEE SHIRTS, SWEATSHIRTS AND HATS will be available for purchase. Bring cash or a checkbook and stock up on some great items to advertise your club.

**ADDRESS:** The address is 1810 State Highway 58 South, Georgetown, TN, near Cleveland and Decatur and not far from Dayton, TN. If you don't have a GPS, here are more detailed instructions:

- From Interstate 75, take exit 49 for TN-30 towards Decatur.
- ◆ Follow TN-30W for 9.3 miles into the stop light in Decatur

## ETRC Club Trial Report Sunday, March 9, 2025, Cory Smith's Farm

Our first event of the season was a Club Trial at Cory & Elena Smith's farm in Niota, TN. The weather was in the high 40s to low 50's, breezy, and the sun eventually came out to warm us up. Thanks to Elena Smith for the delicious baked goodies and the coffee pot!

J. Michael Evans, an AKC Master level judge, designed and judged the test stakes. The Singles Classic included two 220 yard marks across the fields. The hunt test stakes were set up on the pond, and all marks and blinds involves splashing through the water to get marks and blinds on the other side from the line. The marks were all in a line with good wide separation, and there were blinds on either end. Junior dogs used the two left-most marks; the Senior test used the two right-most marks and the blind (out of the arc) on the left. The Master stake used everything! We were able to start more or less on time, and events progressed smoothly throughout the morning until we wrapped up around 1:00 p.m. with a ribbon ceremony.

Thanks to J. Michael Evans for setting up the test and judging, and to everyone who filled in as needed. Thanks also to Lois Luthenauer, who made the long trek from Oneida to bring a good selection of tee shirts for sale, and to Karen Edwards who ran the sign up table. Thanks to Cory and Elena Smith for the use of the farm, for storing our trailers, and for providing the goodies. And, thanks to everyone who came and made this a successful day! It was a small test, but lots of fun for everyone.

Singles Classic: 4 dogs entered, and 3 placed. Results were:

- First place was won by Waylon, a black Labrador Retriever owned & handled by Zach Pry.
- Second place went to Miss Ivy, a yellow Labrador owned & handled by Michael Evans.
- ♦ Third place went to Gus, a Labrador owned & handled by Brent Naveiro.

**Junior Hunter** started the regular hunt test series. Two dogs entered, but Bob Smith used a collar with his Labrador Evie, so was not considered in the results although they did a fine job. Passing was:

Whiskey, owned and handled by guest Ronnie Cowan.

**Senior Hunter:** three dogs entered, and two passed. Passing were:

Waylon and Zach Pry wore a collar and took the test for training, so their good results were not considered as passing.

It was a remarkably warm day for the end of March, and temperatures hit the mid-70s. About perfect for a test!

#### Health Corner

### Field Triage for Working Dogs

Editor's Note: This is the presentation made by Dr. Monica Webb, DVM, of Countryside Veterinary Services, at the ETRC Awards Banquet on February 22, 2025.

#### Slides

#### Notes

#### Triage?

- Stay calm
- Understanding your pet/dog
- ABCs of triage
- Temperature: hypothermia, hyperthermia (normal temperature 100 to 102.5)
- Active bleeding

This is about deciding whether you need to do triage or not.

#### **Understanding Your Dog**

- Behavior
- Genetics (exercise induced collapse (EIC), centronuclear myopathy (CNM)
- Conditioning

Know your dog and what is normal for him/her. Be especially sure to know what their normal resting gum and tongue color is; some black Labs have enough pigment that it may be difficult to tell otherwise, as "normal pink" is not a color for them ever.

#### **ABC's of Triage**

- Airway: clear, fluid, obstruction—foreign object, open wound
- Breathing: respiration rate, respiratory pattern, cyanosis
- Circulation—shock, cardiopulmonary arrest, extreme bradycardia (slow heart rate), hemorrhage

Go through these steps in order. If there is an obstruction, try to remove it.

Cyanosis is a bluish or purplish discoloration of the membranes caused by a lack of oxygen in the blood. This is why it's important to know the normal color of your dog's tongue and gums.

#### **Triage Categories**

#### Green Yellow

- Shaking
- Sprains/strains
- Swimmer's tail
- Paw pad abrasions
- Torn toenails / dewclaws
- Skin lacerations
- Eye injuries
- Minor cuts and scrapes
- Heat/cold stress (Mild)
- Purple/white mucosa
- Non-responsive
- Snake bites
- Chest/abdominal wounds

Red

- Deep punctures
- Blue/Green Algae toxicosis
- Heat/cold stress (Severe)

#### **Notes**

Green — not life threatening, not always necessary to follow up with vet, frequently resolve soon Yellow — not life threatening. Eye injuries unless extremely mild should be seen to by vet as soon as possible to preserve vision.

Red — life threatening, get to vet as soon as possible. See slides below for first aid actions.

Slides Notes

#### **Eyes**

- Penetrating wounds
- Corneal ulcers
- Proptosis

Don't remove items puncturing eye (i.e., moving with eye when eyeball moves)

Proptosis—If eyeball is popped out, use thumb to gently push it back into socket to avoid damage to stretched optic nerve.

#### Sprains, Strains, & Fractures

- Stabilize with bandage material
- Possible fractures may need stabilization with thick bandage
- NSAIDs—Non-Steroidal Anti-Inflammatory
- Cold hose / hydrotherapy
- Rest

Vet wrap & heavy padded bandaging. If injury high on body, wrap with blanket and secure with vet wrap or duct tape.

Don't use hydrogen peroxide, use Chlorhexidine or betadine instead (too much damage to tissues from hydrogen peroxide

#### Paws/Pads

- Abraded pads
- Torn toenails
- Dewclaws

For torn pads & dewclaws, apply cornstarch (better than flour).

#### **Cuts/Scrapes/Penetrating Wounds**

- Cuts & Scrapes—clip and clean
- Lacerations—clean, flush, & bandage
- Deep punctures—clean & bandage
- Chest/abdominal wounds—DO NOT FLUSH, immediate bandaging & head to veterinary clinic
- Penetrating objects—may not always recommend removing

For deep wound, pack with lube and bandage. Get to vet. Do not staple any body parts to any other body parts.

For penetrating objects — often removing may cause more damage / blood loss.

#### **Acute Caudal Myopathy**

- Tail sprain acute onset
- Swimming in cold water, Hunting
- Resolves in 2-10 days
- X-rays to ensure not a tail fracture
- NSAIDs

Swimmer's Tail, Cold Tail — usually will resolve on its own with NSAIDs, rest, but can sometimes be a broken tail instead.

For NSAIDs, use 2 81 mg tabs aspirin, or Carprofen. DO NOT use ibuprofen, too easy to overdose.

#### **Heat and Cold Stress**

#### **HeatStress**

- Heat stress panting, drooling, dull, vomiting or diarrhea, increased heart rate.
- Heat Stroke: difficulty breathing, weakness, seizure, collapse (ER!!), temperature
   105 degrees
- Treating heat stress cooler area but not too cold (don't throw dog in cold water)
- Offer small amounts of cool water
- Cooling mats
- Rubbing alcohol armpits, groin, pads of feet
- Seek veterinary care

#### **Cold Stress**

- Prolonged cold temperature exposure, prolonged cold water submersion, shock, hypothyroid dogs more sensitive
- Shivering, muscle stiffness, pale mucous membranes, collapse, dilated or fixed pupils, slow heart rate, comatose
- Hypothermia dangerous, when dog's body temperature drops too low below 95 degrees
- Warm vehicle or building, wrap in blankets, towels, warm water bottles in axillary areas
- Seek veterinary care

#### **Notes**

For heat stress, avoid too quick cooling or you will make matters worse. Ice can be applied to armpits, groin and pads, but only if wrapped in a towel to avoid skin damage.

If dog will drink, you can also treat cold stress with warm (NOT HOT) liquids.

## Cyanobacterial Toxicosis (Blue/Green Algae Toxicosis)

- Most common in non-flowing fresh water in hot seasons, but has been reported in brackish and salt water
- Area of pea soup appearing water (benthic mats)
- Intoxication can occu with swimming in water, drinking, licking hair coat
- Can present with dermatologic, hepatic, or neurologic clinical signs
- Clinical signs can occur within minutes to hours of exposure
- Shock and seizure are the severe clinical signs
- Rinse dogs with clean water after swimming

#### Notes

Blue-Green algae has been found pretty much all over the United States. Colors vary, so don't expect it to be necessarily 'blue green'; it may be almost any color.

Can appear fairly similar to water meal, which is a pea green grainy algae very common in East Tennessee.

According to Cornell's veterinary website, exposure to toxins produced by blue-green algae can be life threatening and it can rapidly become fatal. There is no antidote — symptomatic treatment and support is the only option.

Algae can be controlled by herbicides applied once a year, if it's a pond on your land.

#### **Slides**

#### **Envenomation** — Snake Bites

- Clinical signs can occur within minutes to hours
- Swelling & edema at the site of the bite (usually muzzle or extremity)
- Number of fang wounds can range from 1 to 6
- Fang puncture wounds without swelling or edema is a 'dry bite' — no envenomation
- Clean wounds & seek veterinarian
- Antivenom can be administered in 4 to 24 hours after snake bite

#### **Notes**

Mostly copperhead bites in East Tennessee.

Most ER clinics carry antivenin.

Non-poisonous bites should still be attended to by a vet — they can get easily infected and cause very gross abscesses.

#### Dr. Webb's Field Triage Emergency Kit

#### **Medicines**

- Dexamethasone 4 mg injectable 2 syringes containing 2.5 cc each syringe give contents of one syringe under skin or in muscle for allergic reaction.
- Diphenhydramine 25 mg for allergies / allergic reaction 1 mg/1 pound of body weight (example, 50 pound dog receives 50 mg every 6 to 8 hours as needed).
- Cephalexin 500 mg antibiotic—1 capsule by mouth twice daily (every 12 hours) for 50 pound dog.
- Metronidazole 250 mg Antibiotic & diarrhea 1 tablet by mouth twice daily (every 12 hours) for under 50 pounds. Use with caution in Collies, Shelties.
- Carprofen 100 mg NSAID 2 mg/pound of body weight for24 hours (example: 50 pound dog would received 100 mg per day, or 50 mg (1/2 tablet) twice daily. DO NOT USE WITHIN 36 HOURS OF PREDNISONE.
- Prednisone 20 mg—Steroir for allergic reactions. Do not administer within 36 hours of an NSAID or 24 hours of Dexamethasone 1 tablet for 40-50 pound dog.

## New AKC Rules — Dealing With Misconduct Effective 2/26/2025

[Editor's Note: This information is reprinted from an email sent out from AKC to member clubs on 2/22/25].

The health and wellbeing of all dogs at AKC events is paramount. After a review of the AKC Discipline Guidelines and in consultation with AKC's Chief Veterinary Officer, Dr. Jerry Klein, the AKC Board of Directors approved two new offenses and associated penalties for individuals that *knowingly* bring dogs that have been diagnosed or exposed to communicable diseases on AKC event grounds. This change is not intended to punish the individual that arrives at an event with a healthy dog that subsequently becomes ill during the events and immediately removes the dog from the grounds. This change is intended to provide Event Committees with authority and recourse should an exhibitor knowingly bring a dog onto the event grounds that has been diagnosed or exposed to a communicable disease, putting other dogs on the grounds of the AKC event at risk. The Event Committee would need to have proof (e.g., diagnosis from a veterinarian, verbal acknowledgement by the exhibitor) of the diagnosis prior to attending the event in order to uphold the charges. The AKC Discipline Guidelines on the AKC website and in the *Dealing with Misconduct at American Kennel Club Events* booklet will be updated to reflect the new offenses and penalties listed below:

**Inappropriate Treatment of Animals** 

Knowingly bringing a dog on event grounds within 30 days of displaying the first clinical signs of communicable disease.

Mitigated: 3mo/\$300 Standard: 6 mo/\$500 Aggravated: Up to life/up to \$10,000

Knowingly bringing a dog on event grounds within 14 days of it being in contact with another dog displaying signs of communicable disease.

Mitigated: 1 mo/\$100 Standard: 3mo/\$300 Aggravated: Up to life/up to \$10,000

### **Proposed AKC Rules — Hunt Test Entries & Judging**

The AKC Board reviewed a recommendation to allow two changes to be made to the *Regulations* for AKC Hunting Tests for Retrievers which are:

- 1. Establish the maximum number of dogs an amateur can handle or enter to three dogs per test when using the Amateur Set Aside program. [Editor's Note: Amateurs can still enter more dogs at the regular opening time; this only applies to the number of dogs that can be entered a day early on the Amateur Set-Aside slots].
- 2. Prohibit a judge from judging his or her professional trainer if they have conducted business within one year.

This will be discussed further at the April AKC Board meeting and if passed, we will provide further information in a later newsletter.

## **Youth Program**



The Luthenauer Young Handler program was established as a memorial to ETRC member Kevin Luthenauer. The program is supported by generous contributions from family and friends to encourage youth participation in retriever sports.
